The United Nations stands with the Austrian Forum for Peace in this essential effort. I wish you a successful and productive Forum.

ABOUT THE AUSTRIAN CENTRE FOR PEACE (ACP)

Events in various parts of the world indicate that war is increasingly becoming a routine matter. The revived rivalry between major powers, the ongoing loss of livelihoods due to the environmental and climate crises, a lack of distributive justice and the effects of rapid and often uncontrolled technological change are having a dramatic impact on peace, security and stability around the world. However, statistics show that wars rarely produce winners.

The Austrian Centre for Peace (ACP) has been showing ways to peace for over 40 years. It offers a neutral platform for dialogue and mediation, whether at the Peace Castle in Stadtschlaining, its second location in Vienna, or worldwide. The ACP capacity development programmes prepare experts for conflict-sensitive work in crisis regions. Research at the ACP provides the basis. Peace education sensitises the younger generations of our society. The ACP has i.a. been awarded the United Nations title "Peace Messenger" and the UNESCO "Peace Education Prize" for its work.

The path to security, stability, and ultimately to peace, is long, extensive and complex. The ACP is seeking to achieve it through various partnerships in the political and security policy context as well as with civil society in Austria and worldwide.

The Austrian Centre for Peace (ACP) was founded in 1982 and is organised as a non-profit, independent, non-partisan association. It consists of the following bodies: General Assembly, Board, Management, Scientific Advisory Board, Auditors and Court of Arbitration. The rights and duties of the members of the respective bodies are set forth in the ACP constitution.

Capacity Development

In terms of capacity development, the ACP focuses on two core areas: the training of peacebuilding experts who are or will be deployed in crisis regions and peace education for schools in Austria. Hundreds of civilian, military or police experts are trained as part of the various training programmes worldwide or in Austria. In this area, the ACP cooperates with the EU, UN and OSCE. The effects of environmental degradation and the climate crisis are an integral part of many training programmes. The use of new technology as a tool for peacebuilding, known as "PeaceTech", is also playing an increasingly important role. ACP's training work in West Africa focusses in particular on humanitarian assistance and disaster relief.

The ACP develops and offers customised training courses on request.

Peace Education

Every year, more than 1 000 pupils take part in the ACP's peace education programmes on conflict and peace skills, non-violent communication, bullying and violence prevention, respectful behaviour, integration and diversity, as well as team building and solidarity. In parallel, systemic skills training is offered for teachers. Moreover, the ACP cooperated with the University College of Teacher Education and the Burgenland Children's and Youth Ombuds Office in developing the "Global Peace Education" university course.

Conflict Resolution

In the past, Austrian stakeholders have made important contributions to international peace policy as valued mediators in conflicts. Against the backdrop of an increasingly conflict-ridden world, this potential needs to be fully utilised again. For mediation to actually contribute to peace, recognised principles such as impartiality, consent of the relevant parties, inclusivity and the principle of doing no harm through one's own actions must be upheld. Peace can only be made with enemies. A peace process must therefore include the parties who exert influence on the conflict.

The ACP supports official negotiations and informal dialogue processes, mediating directly between the parties to a conflict. Initiatives take place at the local, regional and national levels and in a dialogue with formal and informal armed actors, political interest groups and civil society. These activities form the core mission of the ACP.

At international level, the ACP's peacebuilding activities have focussed on the Middle East, Africa and the OSCE region for many years.

Many conflict-ridden countries in Europe's immediate neighbourhood are exceptionally hard hit by the climate crisis, but also particularly ill-equipped to deal with its effects. This further exacerbates or creates new conflict dynamics. The ACP is therefore vigorously pursuing climate change adaptation programmes combined with conflict prevention approaches, particularly in the form of environmental peacebuilding.

In Austria, we specialise in the design and management of conflict resolution within communities, which is intended to contribute to peaceful coexistence

Research

The ACP contributes to the dialogue on current peace policy issues through research, specialist conferences and publications. Such research also forms the basis for policy advice from the ACP. Likewise, research is an important companion to conflict management. On the one hand, it enables to identify significant trends, and on the other, it helps to better understand complicated dynamics in specific conflict areas and thus to propose more realistic solutions to the conflict parties. ACP publications include policy briefs and reports.

Moritz Ehrmann, ACP-Director



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Moritz Ehrmann is Director of the ACP and heads the Conflict Resolution department. He brings to the ACP his extensive experience from varied contexts, including Iraq, Colombia, Jordan, Ukraine, and Yemen, and through his previous work with the International Committee of the Red Cross and as an Austrian diplomat. He began his career with the Austrian foreign service, for which he was most recently deployed to the Austrian OSCE Chairmanship Task Force from 2016 to 2017. Since 2018, he has been engaged in informal international peace mediation.

FOCUS TOPICS AT THE ACP

Environmental Peacebuilding - How the Environment, Climate and Peace are Connected

The environmental and climate crisis is not only a problem of the future – droughts, extreme weather conditions and rising sea levels are already threatening millions of people. People in conflict regions in particular, such as the Sahel, North Africa or the Middle East, are especially exposed to climate change. Environmental and climate crises are also leading to new conflicts there, e.g. over dwindling water resources. Conversely, conflicts have a negative impact on the environment: important infrastructure is wiped out, rivers are polluted and forests are destroyed. Resources and financial means are often used for acts of war instead of investments into a green future. Climate, environment, security, and peace are therefore closely linked and require joint solutions.

A New Focus

In light of this, the ACP has been focussing its work on environmental peacebuilding since 2022. Environmental peacebuilding examines how climate, environment and conflicts are linked, not only looking at causes and problems, but also at possible solutions. Environmental and climate issues can be a starting point for dialogue between conflicting parties. This is not just about the mere management of resources, but also about developing strategies intended to have a long-term and sustainable effect – such as projects relating to shared water resources which also offer job opportunities in the field of organic farming, initiate the regeneration of natural resources and focus on cooperation between the various parties to a conflict.

Environmental Peacebuilding in Practice

Following the introduction of the environment-climate-security nexus in capacity development in 2022 during the EAPTC in Stadtschlaining, and as part of

cooperation initiated by the ACP which involved several European training institutes, further events centering on this topic were held onsite over the course of 2023. These included a network meeting in January 2023 of European peace training institutes to create a common training approach for CSDP missions and a two-day workshop in July 2023 as part of the Austri-

an Forum for Peace. The aim of the workshop was to strengthen the dialogue between state and civil-society actors from the Global South and North as well as international organisations, to identify commonalities and to derive recommendations for dealing with the topic.

Finally, the IPT specialisation course on Environmental Peacebuilding was successfully held at the Peace Castle in November.

Together with its partner institute, the Kofi Annan International Peacebuilding Training Centre (KAIPTC) in Accra, Ghana, the ACP organised a course dedicated to issues at the intersection of gender, climate and humanitarian assistance - a particularly relevant training course for participants from the region due to the increasing number and scale of humanitarian disasters in West Africa as a result of climate effects.

Participants in the ACP's dialogue project in the Persian Gulf – a region affected by extreme water shortages – are facing equally great challenges. The consequences which water scarcity has for security and potential sustainable solutions to the problem were therefore an important part of the dialogue discussions taking place.

What the examples illustrate is this: Environmental peacebuilding is a matter of crucial importance for peace work. The ACP took its first steps in 2022 and 2023, and intends to expand its commitment further in the coming years.

IPT Programme

In 1993 the IPT Programme was established by the ACP as Europe's first training programme for civilian experts in peacekeeping and peacebuilding. Since then, more than 2600 peacebuilding practitioners from 135 countries have been trained. In addition to the IPT Core Course for Peacebuilders, a series of Specialisation Courses are offered on topics such as Environmental Peacebuilding, Intersectional Gender Work, Election Observation and more to equip peacebuilding practitioners working in conflict regions with the lasted knowledge and skills to react to new challenges and opportunities on the ground.

IPT Core Course for Peacebuilders, 5 - 15 October 2024

Through lectures, group exercises, and case studies the training introduces participants to essential knowledge and skills required in peacebuilding. Topics range from peacebuilding concepts and theories, cross-cultural collaboration, the role of different actors, conflict analysis, third party intervention, human rights, transitional justice, dono-harm, gender and more. New challenges and opportunities in peacebuilding arising through climate change and modern information technologies are also addressed. Moreover, through a complex simulation exercise, participants learn how to best respond to crisis situations.

IPT Specialization Course on Environmental Peacebuilding, 23 November – 2 December 2024

Climate change, environmental degradation, and competition over natural resources frequently act as driver and threat multiplier of conflict, while at the same time cooperation on environmental and climate issues can offer important entry points for peacebuilding. During the training, participants learn about the complex interlinkages between the environment, climate, peace, and security and acquire the necessary skills and knowledge to apply a climate and environmental lens to different aspects of peacebuilding work, from conflict analysis to conflict resolution and project development.

FOCUS TOPICS AT THE ACP

PeaceTech is Reflected in all Areas of ACP Activities

Modern conflicts are increasingly shaped by new and emerging technologies. The discourse revolves around weighing the security threats posed by these technologies against their potential for preventing and resolving conflicts through peacebuilding.

"PeaceTech" describes the various tools and processes, such as social media, geographic information systems, data analytics, virtual reality frameworks and other digital technologies which can provide value-added in different areas to improve analytical support. This includes a better understanding and monitoring of conflicts, enhanced situational awareness, boosting innovation in capacity building and training, as well as scaling up peacebuilding efforts.

The ACP has started integrating PeaceTech into its capacity development programme. This includes developing mixed reality training frameworks for training of skills for civilian experts in crisis situations.

PeaceTech is also highly relevant in our conflict resolution work. This is especially urgent since research has shown a severe lack of technology-conflict-peace interfaces geo-referenced and dynamically visualised peace and conflict data that allow predicting various types of conflicts before they arise. The work of the ACP includes a contribution to the development of an early warning tool that dynamically visualises conflicts before they arise by using algorithms and geospatial data.

These first steps allow us to develop PeaceTech based approaches as a core competence to offer integrated solutions to prevent conflicts before they become violent and contribute to sustainable development. In this regard, cross-sectoral coordination with other Humanitarian-Development-Peace (HDP) Nexus partners enables us to coordinate for more impact on the ground.

Towards a Climate of Peace

Recent events in different parts of the world have shown that violence, militarisation and war are once again being used and presented as legitimate ways of asserting economic and political interests. Important peace processes are stalling, multilateral organisations are losing their relevance, the calls for dialogue and civil society-based tools of conflict resolution and peace work are fading, and resources are lacking.

This year's Austrian Forum for Peace, titled "Towards a Climate of Peace", aims to address the challenges of international conflict transformation in a changing world. The conference seeks to strengthen networks, discuss different approaches, initiate thought processes, generate ideas, and contribute to the promotion of sustainable global peace.

Increasing global complexity and unpredictability are exacerbated by the effects of the man-made climate crisis. This threat is felt across conflict lines and can worsen the burden on countries affected by conflict. However, it can also be an opportunity to build trust between opposing parties and work together on solutions. This approach, known as Environmental Peacebuilding, was first discussed at the UN Climate Change Conference COP 28 in 2023 and has been specifically pursued at the ACP for some time.

At the same time, the global system is becoming more fragmented and restructured, partly due to the increasing number of international mediation parties, some of which are involved in conflicts. In this new reality, one possible approach could be to use the comparative advantages of new, different actors in a targeted manner to support regions affected on their way to a climate of peace.

The use of technology, including artificial intelligence, also plays a major role not only in warfare worldwide, but increasingly also in considerations and projects for the prevention of civil conflict and peacebuilding.

Eva Huber, Deputy Director

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Eva Huber is ACP's Deputy Director and in this capacity is responsible, among other things, for the ACP's cooperation portfolio with the Austrian Ministry of Defence as well as other individual projects. She has a background in political science, African studies, and public international law and more than 10 years of experience working for UN peace operations and agencies as well as NGOs. She has supported peace processes through political liaison, strategic planning, capacity-building, community engagement, and programme coordination. In addition to having headed the ACP's project portfolio in Sudan and South Sudan, the peace process in Colombia is currently her area of expertise.



Emerging Powers in a Fragmented World Order Granarium

The outbreak of armed conflicts in many parts of the world - including Russia-Ukraine, Israel-Palestine, or Sudan - along with the pandemic and worsening climate crisis have all added to the unpredictability of the global landscape. Abrogation of the last remaining US-Russian arms control treaties and widespread war crimes further contribute to the erosion of the existing international order. The paralysis of the security and mediation tools of international organisations also exacerbates this crisis. The long period of US hegemony in the international system - which brought stability to the geopolitical environment has correspondingly been replaced by a fragmented world order, with new actors entering the stage and challenging the unipolar political system. Emerging powers play an increasing role in shaping war and peace in the world, as they contribute to a growing rivalry between great powers, while at the same time offering their services for the peaceful resolution of conflicts.



WORKSHOP: CLIMATE FOR ALL(KLIMAZUMMITMACHEN)

Good Practice Examples of Participatory Climate Projects at the Communal Level

To achieve progress in dealing with the climate crisis, major changes have to take place. To reach that goal, participatory approaches to increase the qualities of ideas, to raise awareness as well as acceptance for the changes are necessary, especially within a democratic framework.

In this workshop we will focus on the communal level by studying and discussing three impressive participation projects from Austria.

Deputy mayor Ulrike Feichtinger of the city of Gmunden will present the project "Climate strategy Gmunden 2030". Between December 2021 and September 2022, citizens, institutional stakeholder, experts and politicians of this 13.000 inhabitants-city worked in different formats, such as "Citizens Assembly", digital surveys or expert workshops and produced a comprehensive program for the city.

Roger Hackstock, head of "Austria Solar" and Michael Hilpert, regional manager of the "Climate-Energy-Model Region Carnica-Rosental" (KEM) will present the initiative "Climate protection takes place/Klimaschutz findet Stadt". It was conducted in the Carinthian city of Ferlach between March 2022 and December 2023. Again, in different formats, the stakeholders of Ferlach developed a program for a "climate neutral Ferlach" in 2040.

Tijana Matic, from the Viennese department for Energy planning/Magistratsabteilung 20, will present the "Viennese Climate Team/Wiener Klimateam". This program of the municipal administration of Vienna started off with a pilot phase in the years 2022 to 2023 in 6 different wards of Vienna. With a variety of in-place and digital participation formats, citizens and stakeholders are actively motivated to develop and present


ideas for urban climate protection. In 6 phases, where a citizens jury plays an important role, the ideas are processed from the start until realization.

Finally, as a fourth presenter, Werner Fischer from the Austrian NGO "Verein Klimarat", a nationwide Citizens Assembly, shares a broader perspective on participation in Austria and comments on the outcomes of the workshop from his perspective as an expert in the field of climate politics as well as in participation..




PEACE EDUCATION WORK-SHOPS

Homeland Earth – Polycrisis Seeks Answers In A Planetary Consciousness

The globalization push of the last decades has linked all people on all continents and all nations in a complex way and brought them into an indissoluble relationship with each other. Thus, whether we like it or not, an earthly community of destiny has emerged. This is made visible by the global polycrisis that affects us all, albeit in different ways: drastic and man-made climate change, the extinction of species triggered by our economy and way of life, the danger of self-extinction through a nuclear strike, nationalistically motivated wars or the global Covid-19 pandemic. These are all challenges and problems that can only be solved together, and on a planetary level: homeland Earth.

The Workshop will investigate and discuss possibilities to foster a planetary consciousness through peace education.



Kick-off Bounce back Project

The workshop offers interdisciplinary expertise on resilience promotion, character building and strengthening life skills from the perspective of medicine, psychology, and ethics.

It is dedicated to the implementation in the areas of primary and secondary education within the framework of the EU Interreg-ATHU project BOUNCE BACK. The final panel will be the joint panel of peace and life skills pedagogy "Peace and Life-Skils-Pedagogy as influencing factors for a climate of peace".
