He has extensive experience in negotiating with armed conflict parties, mediating inclusive peace processes and process design for mediation. He has worked as an advisor to senior envoys and diplomats, was previously Mediation Advisor at the European External Action Service (EEAS), Mediation Adviser in the United Nations to several Special Envoys and SRSGs, and a Conflict Researcher at the Nordic Africa Institute in Uppsala, Sweden. Eldridge Adolfo has a range of mediation experiences from various countries across Africa, as well as in Colombia, Venezuela, Georgia, Myanmar, Ukraine, the Balkans and Afghanistan. He holds a Master's degree in International Relations from Stockholm University.
